One of those "eyesores" is the dandelion that we all strive to eliminate. Not so fast! Here are some fun facts about the benefits of dandelions:

The pollen of the early blooming dandelion is extremely nutritious for bees. By the time the dandelion blossoms are waning, there are lots of other flowers starting to bloom. To prevent a yard full of nothing but dandelions, pluck the heads off just before they erupt full of seeds. (Far easier than weeding out the actual plant.) The incredibly long taproot of the dandelion is nature's miner. It transfers minerals, especially calcium, upward from deeper soil layers and deposits them nearer the surface, and therefore returns to the surface minerals that have

leached down too deep for other plants to use. This versatile plant is beneficial to humans too. All parts of the dandelion plant are edible. The leaves are loaded with vitamins A and C, and also the minerals lutein and zeaxanthin, which properties make them crucial for eye health. The leaves have more protein than spinach, and the bitter taste can be masked by sautéing in olive oil. Yum! The sap from the dandelion stem has anti-inflammatory properties which make it beneficial for treating many skin ailments, including painful stings from insects!
