### Horticulture Tip.

If you are dividing a perennial, first soak the area around the plant well. Dig up the clump to be divided. If the roots are still tight, put the clump in a container with water and soak it a little longer to loosen the roots. Use a sharp garden tool to divide the root ball. Once the plant is separated and potted up, keep it out of the sunlight and well watered until the plant is no longer drooping. Then move it into the light exposure appropriate for the plant.
